MAJOR GARRETT //

Major Garrett is a congressional correspondent for National Journal. Prior to National Journal, Garret reported for Fox News, where he was the Chief White House Correspondent. During his eight years at Fox, Garrett also covered Congress, two presidential elections, the war in Iraq and many other issues of national importance.

Before joining Fox News, Garrett was a White House correspondent for CNN, covering Presidents Bush and Clinton. Prior to that he was a senior editor and congressional correspondent for U.S. News and World Report, where he reported on Congress and the impeachment of President Clinton. From 1990-1995, he was a congressional reporter for The Washington Times, and from 1995-1997, he was the newspaper's deputy national editor. Earlier in his career Garrett was a reporter for The Houston Post, Las Vegas Review-Journal and the Amarillo Globe-News.

Garrett's also authored three books. His third, *The Enduring Revolution* (2005), was recently voted one of the best non-fiction political books of all time by readers of Chris Cillizza's Washington Post "The Fix" blog.

CHRISTOPHER PREBLE //

Christopher A. Preble is the vice president for defense and foreign policy studies at the Cato Institute. He is the author of three books including *The Power Problem: How American Military Dominance Makes Us Less Safe, Less Prosperous and Less Free* (Cornell University Press, 2009), which documents the enormous costs of America's military power, and proposes a new grand strategy to advance U.S. security; and *John F. Kennedy and the Missile Gap* (Northern Illinois University Press, 2004), which explores the political economy of military spending during the 1950s and early 1960s. Preble is also the lead author of *Exiting Iraq: How the U.S. Must End the Occupation and Renew the War against Al Qaeda* (Cato Institute, 2004); and he co-edited, with Jim Harper and Benjamin Friedman, *Terrorizing Ourselves: Why U.S. Counterterrorism Policy Is Failing and How to Fix It* (Cato Institute, 2010). In addition to his books, Preble has published over 150 articles in major publications including USA Today, the *Los Angeles Times*, the *Financial Times*, *National Review*, *The National Interest*, the *Harvard International Review*, and *Foreign Policy*. He is a frequent guest on television and radio. Before joining Cato in February 2003, he taught history at St. Cloud State

University and Temple University. Preble was a commissioned officer in the U.S. Navy, and served onboard USS Ticonderoga (CG-47) from 1990 to 1993. Preble holds a Ph.D. in history from Temple University.

JANNE NOLAN //

Dr. Janne Nolan is the Director for Nuclear Security at the American Security Project. She has held numerous senior positions in the private sector, including Foreign Policy Director at the Century Foundation, Senior Fellow in foreign policy at The Brookings Institution, and Senior International Security Consultant at Science Applications International Corporation. Her public service includes positions as a Foreign Affairs Officer in the Department of State; Senior Representative to the Senate Armed Services Committee for Senator Gary Hart; and member of the National Defense Panel, the Accountability Review Board investigating terrorist attacks on U.S. embassies in East Africa, and the Secretary of Defense's Policy Board. Nolan is the author of six books, including *Guardians of the Arsenal: The Politics of Nuclear Strategy*, *Trappings of Power: Ballistic Missiles in the Third World*, and *Elusive Consensus*.

JOSH ROGIN //

Josh Rogin covers national security and foreign policy and writes the daily Web column *The Cable*.

Previously, Josh covered defense and foreign policy as a staff writer for *Congressional Quarterly*, writing extensively on Iraq, Afghanistan, Guantánamo Bay, U.S.-Asia relations, defense budgeting and appropriations, and the defense lobbying and contracting industries. Prior to that, he covered military modernization, cyber warfare, space, and missile defense for *Federal Computer Week Magazine*. He has also served as Pentagon Staff Reporter for the *Asahi Shimbun*, Japan's leading daily newspaper, in its Washington, D.C., bureau, where he reported on U.S.-Japan relations, Chinese military modernization, the North Korean nuclear crisis, and more.

A graduate of George Washington University's Elliott School of International Affairs, Josh lived in Yokohama, Japan, and studied at Tokyo's Sophia University. He speaks conversational Japanese and has reported from the region. He has also worked at the House International Relations Committee, the Embassy of Japan, and the Brookings Institution.

Josh's reporting has been featured on CNN, MSNBC, C-Span, CBS, ABC, NPR, WTOP, and several other outlets. He was a 2008-2009 National Press Foundation's Paul Miller Washington Reporting Fellow and a 2009 military reporting fellow with the Knight Center for Specialized Journalism. He hails from Philadelphia and lives in Washington, D.C.

LAWRENCE J. KORB //

Lawrence J. Korb is a Senior Fellow at the Center for American Progress. He is also a senior advisor to the Center for Defense Information and an adjunct professor at

Georgetown University. Prior to joining the Center for American Progress he was a senior fellow and director of National Security Studies at the Council on Foreign Relations. From July 1998 to October 2002 he was council vice president, director of studies, and holder of the Maurice Greenberg Chair.

Prior to joining the council, Dr. Korb served as director of the Center for Public Policy Education and senior fellow in the Foreign Policy Studies Program at the Brookings Institution; dean of the Graduate School of Public and International Affairs at the University of Pittsburgh; vice president of corporate operations at the Raytheon Company; and director of defense studies at the American Enterprise Institute.

Dr. Korb served as assistant secretary of defense (manpower, reserve affairs, installations, and logistics) from 1981 through 1985. In that position, he administered about 70 percent of the defense budget. For his service in that position, he was awarded the Department of Defense's medal for Distinguished Public Service. Dr. Korb served on active duty for four years as Naval Flight Officer, and retired from the Naval Reserve with the rank of captain. He received his Ph.D. in political science from the State University of New York at Albany and has held full-time teaching positions at the University of Dayton, the Coast Guard Academy, and the Naval War College.

Dr. Korb has authored, co-authored, edited, or contributed to more than 20 books and written more than 100 articles on national security issues. His books include *The Joint Chiefs of Staff: The First Twenty-five Years*; *The Fall and Rise of the Pentagon*; *American National Security: Policy and Process, Future Visions for U.S. Defense Policy*; *Reshaping America's Military*; *A New National Security Strategy in an Age of Terrorists, Tyrants, and Weapons of Mass Destruction*; *Serving America's Veterans*; and *Military Reform*.

His articles have appeared in such journals as *Foreign Affairs*, *Public Administration Review*, *The New York Times Sunday Magazine*, *Naval Institute Proceedings*, and *International Security*.

LOREN B. THOMPSON //

Loren B. Thompson is Chief Operating Officer of the non-profit Lexington Institute and Chief Executive Officer of Source Associates, a for-profit consultancy. Prior to holding his present positions, he was Deputy Director of the Security Studies Program at Georgetown University and taught graduate-level courses in strategy, technology and media affairs at Georgetown. He has also taught at Harvard University's Kennedy School of Government.

Mr. Thompson holds doctoral and masters degrees in government from Georgetown University and a bachelor of science degree in political science from Northeastern University. He was born in 1951 and currently resides in McLean, Virginia and Plymouth, Massachusetts with his wife Carla and two children - Matthew and Ariel, twins born in 1997.

MICHAEL BREEN //

An expert and articulate voice on America's security challenges, Mike Breen has quickly become a prominent spokesman for the progressive national security community. He has appeared in numerous national and regional media outlets on a wide range of issues, particularly energy security, refugees, counterinsurgency, and counterterrorism.

A decorated former Army Captain, Breen served in tactical and operational assignments in both Afghanistan and Iraq. In Afghanistan, Breen led a platoon of paratroopers operating in the Korengal and Pech valleys, often in support of Special Operations Forces. In Iraq, Breen managed civil-military relations for his infantry company as the acting "mayor" of several Baghdad neighborhoods, coordinating governance and essential services for over 300,000 Iraqi civilians. Breen also served as Effects-Based Operations Officer for Combined Joint Task Force 76 and Division Targeting Officer for 1st Armored Division.

After leaving the Army, Breen received a JD from Yale Law School and clerked for the Office of White House Counsel, where he focused on homeland and national security issues.

Breen is a Founding Director of the Iraqi Refugee Assistant Project, an international organization which helps resettle Iraqi Refugees, as well as the Yale Law Foreign Policy Workshop, which provides consulting services on foreign policy and national security issues. He has consulted for government agencies, the United Nations, private foundations, and an international war crimes tribunal.

Mike holds a BA in Government from Dartmouth College and a JD from Yale Law School, having studied in Russia, Kazakhstan, and Uzbekistan. Originally from New Hampshire, Mike and his wife currently live in Washington, DC.



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
